

Pillings' Lake


Shortly after the trolley line was completed in 1907, Ralph Pillings, a Philadelphia banker, acquired the body of water south of Clementon Lake. This was the location of the old saw-mill of Jeremiah Seeds. Mr. Pillings developed the lake primarily for bathing and swimming. This lake could be reached from the trolley terminal or train station through Clementon Park, along Lake Avenue or along East Atlantic Avenue. On Sunday summer evenings, lines of people streamed along these routes heading homeward. With the popularity of the lake and the automobile in the 1920's, Lake Avenue and Berlin Road was a bottle-neck for traffic.

Pillings' Lake was the site of many swimming and diving meets held by the Philadelphia Turners (Turnverein), a German-American athletic organization.

When the Philadelphia Sesquicentennial Exposition site near Hog Island was being dismantled in 1927, the 150-foot flagpole was brought to Pillings' Lake where for many years the flags flying from the mast could be seen for miles. The ownership of the lake passed through several hands. The lake is now called Blue Mirror Lake and remains as a reminder of its glorious past when it gave pleasure to so many people. Some of Clementon's residents today were first made aware of the area by coming to Pillings' Lake for a swim.




Pillings' Lake was declared "the Miami of New Jersey" and a "bather's paradise" by a brochure printed by Clementon Township in 1922. The brochure called the lake a place where "professional swimmers train, beginners learn, and the bathers delight to congregate." The lake's official Olympic 10-meter tower served as an informal trademark for many years.

Silver Lake Park

Silver Lake Park was located on the lake at Trout Avenue midway between Berlin Road and the White Horse Pike. This lake began to be developed for recreation about the time Clementon Township was formed. In the next ten years or so, a bathhouse was built and the lake became a favorite for bathers and canoeists. Silver Lake had for hire quite a fleet of canoes that remained in service there for many years.

The writer still has one of these canoes which was built in 1917 and is still in good condition. During the 1920's and early 1930, Silver Lake Park was well known in the area for the many sporting events held in the Silver Lake Casino. Area championship basketball games were held. Bennie Bass, the feather weight champion, held exhibition prize fights here while in training for his successful bout for the junior lightweight (130 lbs.) championship of the world. Clementon's own ring representative, Rosario Lucca ("Kid Locke") promoted many boxing exhibitions in this great old building which was destroyed by fire in 1936.

If you're lucky to live near the water, you're lucky enough. We have lived across the road from Silver Lake nearly five decades and love the lake. One morning in 1987, I opened the front door and the lake was gone, all but a ten foot wide stream down the middle of the lake bed. The dam collapsed, it was devastating and very ugly. In 1992 Camden County bought the lake and rebuilt the dam. In 1988, Pillings' Lake dam also was washed out. Unfortunately, the dam was never rebuilt. The significance of our lakes is what made our town what it was, we should treasure them and protect them.

With the continuation of the Executive Order, the John Leshner Senior Center remains closed to the public. We look forward to its reopening just as soon as it is safe to do so.

In the meantime, here are five ways seniors can stay active while following social distancing guidelines:

Walking

Many communities with "shelter-in-place" orders have made exceptions allowing outdoor exercise. If the weather is pleasant and it's possible to avoid crowds, a walk around the neighborhood can provide sufficient



exercise to reduce restlessness and deliver mood and immune boosting benefits. If your loved one must stay indoors,

walking around the house or marching in place can increase daily step counts.

Exercise and strength training

Yoga, Pilates, tai chi, and stretching can help seniors stay fit at home during "shelter-in-place" orders and can improve balance, flexibility, core strength, and overall mobility. Many instructional videos can be found online, and some are even tailored specifically for older adults. Another option is joining a virtual class hosted by an area exercise studio or senior center.

Strength training is also important for seniors - and it does not necessarily involve lifting heavy weights at the gym. Many strength-training exercises for the elderly can be done at home while sitting or lying down. Seniors only need their body weight and a few simple exercises to get started. If desired, they can use everyday household items such as soup cans to add weight for exercises.

Dancing

Known for its cardiovascular benefits, dancing is a fun, low-impact way to exercise and boost endurance during long days of social distancing. As an added benefit, listening to some favorite music may even encourage your loved one to exercise their mind by taking a pleasant "walk" down memory lane.

Gardening

For older adults who enjoy being outdoors, gardening can enhance outdoor spaces while burning calories and providing a healthy dose of fresh air. Although some older adults may not be mobile enough to dig in the dirt, there are other alternatives to reap the benefits of gardening.

Potting small plants or herbs to be maintained indoors or decorating an enclosed porch or patio can provide an afternoon's diversion and keep your loved one moving and active.

Arts and crafts

Older adults who have limited mobility can stay active at home by participating in arts and crafts. Whether knitting, crocheting, painting, coloring, or working with clay, arts and crafts can help older adults maintain their dexterity and cognitive skills.

Veterans Affairs in Clementon

Many people, even residents of Clementon, are not aware that Wooster Towers, located at 22 Gibbsboro Road in Clementon is a place where many Veterans call home. Veterans are given priority for an apartment here at Wooster Towers, which is an independent living facility, provided they meet the age requirement of 62 and the income requirement. I am currently a resident at Wooster Towers. I grew up in Lindenwold, but my mother and her family resided in Clementon since the 1930's. As a teenager I watched Wooster Towers being built, and my mother always spoke about Ora Wooster making certain Veterans and Seniors would have affordable housing. I never dreamed that one day I would be living at Wooster Towers and have the privilege, along with other residents who are not Veterans, to help those who are Veterans. Currently we have World War II, the Korean War and the Viet Nam War represented by Veterans who reside here at Wooster Towers, along with Veterans from other states as they have heard about Wooster Towers from the Veterans Administration in their state.

In November 2018 we had our first "Honor Our Vet Day" at Wooster Towers. In May 2019 plans were already underway to have another "Honor Our Vet Day" when I met Kathleen Van Stine, Senior Director for Community Relations, Spectra Care Foundation who manages the Carlton R. Rouh Veteran Center located at 777 Blackwood Clementon Road, Lindenwold, which is only

about 2 miles from Wooster Towers. A meeting was arranged for Mrs. Van Stine to meet Barbara Murray, Secretary/Public Housing Coordinator of Wooster Towers, to determine how the Veterans who reside at Wooster Towers could benefit from various services that could be provided by Spectra Care Foundation. We were able to have a health fair with several vendors attend during our November 2019 "Honor Our Vet Day" and Spectra Care was able to provide Art Therapy for Seniors and Veterans in March 2020 just days before the Covid-19 pandemic and shelter-in-place was announced.

Although our 2020 "Honor Our Vet Day" at Wooster Towers did not take place due to the Pandemic, we were able to provide our Veteran's with bags filled with donated items and Veteran Day cards provided by several concerned residents in the surrounding communities, Friends of Clementon Food Pantry and Spectra Care foundation.

We were also able to put our "Honor all Those Who Serve" display back in the area here at Wooster Towers that was once designated for the phone booth over 50 years ago. Many things may have changed over those 50 years but what has not changed is a community of caring people. For the Christmas holidays, we had several groups participate in reaching out to our Veterans here at Wooster Towers. Dave Cornwell from Friends of Clementon Food Pantry coordinated with the help of several of his volunteers to provide a hot meal which was distributed by Wooster Towers volunteers on Christmas Eve, a Spectra Care Foundation volunteer helped coordinate and distribute bags which contained lap blankets and many other items. A group of caring Clementon residents coordinated by Gwen Cantwell reached out to Veterans and residents of Wooster Towers with gift bags and numerous goodies. Lynn Brewin Lofland coordinated the 10th year Adopt-a-Grandparent group who provided gift bags for all residents. We deeply appreciate all that the community groups do each year for the Veterans and residents of Wooster Towers.

Several of our Veterans are looking forward to the Carlton R. Rouh Veteran Center, managed by Spectra Care Foundation, to open so they can use the facilities and services which will be provided to Veterans in the South Jersey area. Renovations to the Spectra Care building had to be placed on hold because the roof is leaking. They are currently asking for donations from the public. Contact information is www.rouhcenter.org and www.spectracarefoundation.org.

The Friends of Clementon Food Pantry, in addition to helping all those in need of food during the pandemic, has also assisted Veterans in Clementon and the surrounding boroughs as needed with food when they are

aware such a need exists. Many residents here at Wooster Towers have all assisted Veterans who may need help furnishing their apartment. Due to the pandemic, many county agencies were not able to make visits to assist Veterans with numerous paperwork that may need to be completed to help them get support services, so a future goal is to try and get Zoom meetings arranged and better coordination of the various agencies assigned to provide our Vets with health care and support services.

The Clementon Environmental Commission meets the third Wednesday of the month at 7:30pm, downstairs in the Community Center. However, during the pandemic we have had to scale back and hold meetings that can be outside. Hopefully, we will be back on a normal schedule soon. We are members of the Association of New Jersey Environmental Commissions (“ANJEC”) and The South Jersey Land and Water Trust (“SJL&WT”).

Because of the pandemic, a few things we have been working on have been put on hold. The planned Clementon Stream Day with SJL&WT that was scheduled for May 2020 will be rescheduled for spring of 2021. This event will also include a clean-up of the waterways in the center of town. A big Thank You to SJL&WT for coming to the borough to assess the streams. The quarterly Adopt A Road cleanup will also resume, hopefully this spring.

We have been able to move forward with some projects. One of our members completed a grant writing course and is working with Clementon’s Sustainable New Jersey Green Team to prepare and submit grants.

Jack Gruber has been working to keep the Butterfly Garden beautiful. Be sure to check it out! Some plants you can find there are Butterfly and Common Milkweed, which are host plants for Monarchs. Other butterflies observed are varieties of Swallowtail, Sulphur, Skippers, and many others. Other plants are Morning Glory, which is attractive to hummingbirds, Blue Mist, Virginia Spiderwort, and lots more. There are also plenty of birds to be seen there. Did you know Clementon has 190 confirmed bird species? A full list of all the plants and species sighted at the garden will be on our website at <https://clementonenvironmental.weebly.com>.

We are also working to address some issues such as: Pesticide use and the hazards it poses to pollinators and our waterways; feral cats and their threat to wildlife and pets, including the risk of rabies spread; and alien plants and how they are impacting our local ecology.

Guidelines:

- Whenever possible, please park vehicles in driveway or off road during the scheduled collection week.
- There will be one pickup per scheduled collection week.
- There will be no late out collections. If first week collection is missed, leaves will have to be stored on residents' property until the next scheduled collection date. This will be strictly enforced.
- Rake leaves to curb line, or place in open bags or containers.
- If placed in open bags, please leave a trash can curbside to dispose of emptied bags.
- Keep leaves at least 10 feet away from any storm drain or outfall (NJDEP Rule).
- Bags should not exceed 50 pounds.
- Please do not put leaves out more than one (1) week prior to your scheduled collection date.
- Do not mix brush, dirt, stone, or any other debris with leaves.

STATUS OF CLEMENTON PARK

On Wednesday, March 3, Mayor Tom Weaver held a town hall meeting to discuss the auction of Clementon Park (the "Park"). Particulars of the auction, as taken from 42freeway.com are:

- The auction is scheduled for Tuesday, March 23, 2021 at 10am
- Inspection is set for Friday, March 19, 2021 from 9am to 4pm.
- The Park will be offered in Entirety or Separate Pieces, including the liquor license.
- Capital Recovery Group is conducting the auction and is listed as "Sale By Order of Howard Samuels - Receiver."
- The auction can be found at crgllc.com/auctions.

Information obtained from the meeting is as follows:


- The owners of the Park walked away in September 2019.
- Buyers have been looking at the Park through 2020.
- TD Bank holds the note on the Park, and hired attorneys Stark & Stark, who in turn hired Capital Recovery Group ("CRG") to get the park sold.
- There has been a buyer interested. The buyer signed papers, but never transferred the funds. The belief is that this buyer is still interested.
- The General Manager of the Park is continuing to take interested buyers through the Park.
- The area is zoned AP (Amusement Park), and the Planning and Zoning Board is not interested in changing that designation at this time.
- Can the Borough of Clementon purchase the Park? No. Clementon has a limit of the amount that can be borrowed. With what is already loaned to Clementon, there is an available amount of approximately \$5,000,000. This would not be enough to purchase the park and provide the necessary upkeep of the Borough.
- Can the County purchase the Park? They have no interest in purchasing.
- Does the Park owe back taxes/utilities? Yes, approximately \$600,000.
- Will Clementon be able to recoup the back taxes/utilities? Yes, whoever purchases the Park will be responsible for any fees owed to Clementon.
- What about the dam loan? There are several parts to this question:
 - The Park took a loan, with the Borough as a co-signer.
 - The reasoning behind Clementon being a co-signer was that it was possible the Park would take too long to have the funds to repair the dam. By the time they did, the lake could be drained and become another eco-system, causing the DEP to determine nothing could be done because the new eco-system would be destroyed. (*Think Pillings' Lake*).
 - As of July 2019, the balance on the loan was approximately \$262,237.
 - The loan required 2 payments per year in the amount of approximately \$16,129.
 - As of now, 4 payments have been missed for an approximate total \$64,156.
- The Park is assessed at \$5,300,000.
- The tax appeal that the Park won, in which Clementon owed the Park, is complete. Clementon no longer owes Clementon Park any overpaid taxes.
